Deschutes River Alliance

With Jonah Sandford



Jonah Sandford is the Executive Director and Staff Attorney for the Deschutes River Alliance. The DRA was founded in 2013 by a group of longtime Deschutes River advocates, who had serious concerns about the observed ecological impacts of a new "Selective Water Withdrawal" (SWW) tower at the Pelton Round Butte Hydroelectric Complex. Since the SWW tower began operation in 2010, river users have observed several serious negative ecological changes in the lower Deschutes River. These changes include increased nuisance algae proliferation, warmer spring and summer water

temperatures, and significant changes in aquatic insect diversity and abundance. Together, these new problems have dramatically altered the recreational experiences on the lower Deschutes, a treasured central Oregon fly fishing destination.

On January 11, Jonah will discuss the impacts of SWW operations on the lower Deschutes, and highlight the DRA's ongoing efforts to protect and restore the ecology of this amazing river.



Fly Fishing Tips, Tricks, and Techniques

“Google” is an amazing fly fishing tool! Search for “fly fishing tips” and see what you can find. Here is a sample. Are these helpful?

- **Remove the Barbs** – It’s a good idea to remove the barb on your hooks (crush them with pliers and re-sharpen) in order to make it easier to remove a hook from a fish. In addition it will be easier to remove a hook from a human if an accident occurs. Accidents like this *can* occur when fly fishing, so make sure to be careful.

- **Invest in Polarized Glasses** – A good pair of polarized glasses will make you a more effective fisherman. Polarized glasses will allow you see through the water and locate potential pockets and pools of fish.

- **Stealth is Important** – Don’t rush down to the shore, make sure to take your time and walk slowly. Fish aren’t blind and they can sense vibrations from both the land and the water. Moving slowly will make fish less likely to scatter when you approach the area you’re going to fish in. You should try to wear clothing that can help you blend into the environment.

- **Watch Your Fly** – You’ll want to examine your fly after every fish you catch and failed hook you set. Make sure the wings aren’t rotated out of place and that the hackle isn’t damaged. You’ll want something on hand to dry/clean-off your artificial fly after you’ve caught a fish.

- **Be Careful When Drifting** – You only really need to drift about 6 to 8 feet, any farther and you’ll have line management problems. One of the main culprits of over drifting is casting too far to begin with. Keep it short and simple until you become more proficient with line management.

First Club Outing of 2018—Wi-Ne-Ma Lake, Saturday January 27

If you haven’t already done so, check out our list of 2018 outings here in this newsletter or on our website (www.santiamflycasters.com). Lots of opportunities!

Our first outing for 2018 is at the lake at Camp Wi-Ne-Ma on the coast north of Neskowin. This lake has a good population of native Cutthroat Trout that have been cooperative the past few years.

To get there, drive west on Highways 22 and 18 and either drive to Highway 101 and turn right or turn right onto the Three Rivers Highway 22 at Valley Junction, turn left onto the Little Nestucca River Highway at Dolph Junction and then left onto Highway 101. The Winema Road turns west off Highway 101 between Mileposts 93 and 94 just north of the viewpoint.

Leroy will have things open around 8:00, with hot coffee available, and will serve lunch around noon for a nominal fee of \$5. If the weather does not cooperate, bring your fly tying gear or we can also practice casting inside.

A floating device provides the best access to the lake, but one can fish from the shore at a couple of spots. Use a light rod with either floating or intermediate line. Woolly buggers and other subsurface flies work well, probably with a bead-head for floating line. Green has been a successful color.



2018 Santiam Flycasters Annual Auction Thursday February 8

Make sure to mark your calendar for this important date. The Santiam Flycasters Annual Auction is a win-win for our club. It raises funds necessary for the club to cover costs of speaker fees, Pringle Hall rental fee, outing costs, and other administrative expenses necessary to operate the club. Donated items should be clean and in good condition (one fly fisher’s surplus is another’s treasure).

Fly of the Month **Possie Bugger**

Attractor Pattern

Material List:

- Hook:** #12-8 Nymph Picture shows a Dai-Riki 730 2X #8.
Thread: 6/0 Black
Weight: .020 Lead Optional 5 turns
Tungsten Bead: Gold (or Black) fit to hook size
Tail: Australian Possum with 1 strand of Pearl Flashabou on each side (Flashabou extends ¼ inch beyond tail)
Body: Squirrel or rabbit dubbing (color of choice.)
Rib: Pearl Flashabou with BR copper wire counter wrapped to bead
Hackle: Partridge feather
Collar: Black UV Ice Dub or Peacock

The Possie Bugger is a popular fly throughout the Northwest and is available in fly shops., but is used in many other areas as well. It can be effective tied in multiple colors from light to dark. For some reason, several of the well-known fly tying books fail to mention this fly. It has performed well on local rivers and stillwater lakes.

Tying Instructions: Thread bead on the hook and insert hook in vice. Smash the barb down. Lay down a thread base and add five wraps of non-lead .020 wire behind bead. Secure wire with thread wraps. Continue thread wraps down the hook until parallel to the barb.

Add Australian Possum tail about the length of the hook gap. Place small strip of Pearl Flashabou on either side of the tail and secure in place. This Flashabou should extend ¼ inch beyond the tail. Tie in three-inch strip of Ultra BR size copper wire on the side of the hook and then tie in a three-inch strip of Pearl Flashabou. Allow both wire and Flashabou to hang behind the hook for later use.

Secure a squirrel dubbing noodle around thread and wrap from tail to within 1/8 inch of the bead and tie off. Spiral the Flashabou around the hook in five evenly spaced wraps to the bead and tie off. Counter wrap copper wire in five evenly spaced wraps to the bead and tie off. The wire helps reinforce the dubbing and Flashabou.

Tie Partridge hackle in by the tip, trim off the tip and run scissors down both sides of the stem to loosen the barbs. Fold both sides of feather back and wrap two or three turns toward the bead secure the feather with two turns of thread. Pull the hackle back and force it down with two more wraps of tying thread. Make a small dubbing noodle of black ice dub or peacock hurl, wrap the noodle around the hook pushing the hackle back and filling the 1/8th space behind the bead. Whip finish, and trim thread. Add a small amount of head cement and the fly is ready to fish. Fishes similar to a Prince Nymph.




NW Fly Tyers & Fly Fishing Expo
